Language Arts 6 Syllabus

English Language Arts 6

English Language Arts 6 is based on the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for sixth grade. This course integrates listening, speaking, writing and reading with an emphasis on literary analysis. Students read narrative and informational text and analyze their structure, elements, and style. Vocabulary strategies are taught and reinforced through a variety of literature. Using the writing process and the six traits of writing, students write narrative and expository pieces, such as a personal narrative and an argumentative essay. The mechanics of writing, including sentence structure, spelling and grammar, are taught and reinforced through student writing. Students develop speaking and listening skills by participating in group discussions and oral presentations.

Textbook - Holt McDougal Literature Online textbook Username and Password will be assigned.

Students will read a variety of self-selected books throughout the school year. Teachers will work with students and parents to choose appropriate reading selections. In addition, students will read class novels from the following list:

MS The Cay by Theodore Taylor

When he and his mother sail on a ship heading to America, Phillip suddenly finds himself stranded on a raft with a black man named Timothy. After he loses his eyesight, Phillip must learn to trust Timothy if he is to have any chance of surviving and being rescued from the small island where they have landed.

MS Watsons Go to Birmingham by Christopher Paul Curtis

The ordinary interactions and everyday routines of the Watson's, an African-American family living in Flint, Michigan, are drastically changed after they go to visit Grandma Sands in Alabama in the summer of 1963.
